We place tremendous emphasis on results and continually monitor how we deliver care. For example, **our community-based services achieved outstanding results.** Our Multisystemic Therapy programs continue to exceed established Connecticut benchmarks for keeping youth at home, in school and in the community. We continue to receive excellent client satisfaction ratings. For the past two years, we exceeded the state's Enhanced Care Clinic Access standard for our children and adult outpatient services.

We gained additional support and recognition at the national level. Our innovative, collaborative approach earned us a five-year federal grant from the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to deliver mental health services to young children and their families in New Britain. We also received SAMHSA's 2010 Science and Service Award for our community-based continuum of care for youth exhibiting, or at risk of exhibiting, problem sexual behavior.

We continued to expand our community justice programs. We opened new Alternative in the Community programs in Meriden and Middletown. We launched new Juvenile Justice Intermediate Evaluation (JJIE), Multidimensional Therapy-Reentry and Family Treatment (MDFT-RAFT) and Multisystemic Therapy-Family Integrated Transitions (MST-FIT) programs, and significantly broadened our geographic reach throughout the state.

We expanded our array of communications tools, including our vibrant, new website, featuring inspiring stories and comprehensive information and resources to better serve our constituencies. We encourage you to visit at wheelerclinic.org.

Wheeler Clinic has made measurable strides, and our outcomes are a testament to our commitment, resolve and array of critical programs. Highlights and Accomplishments

Wheeler Clinic expanded our programs and services and broadened our reach throughout Connecticut. Our innovation, creativity, commitment to excellence and generous support of our communities and donors made 2011 a year full of growth and achievement.

The clinic:

- ✓ Received a five-year \$3.25 million grant from the U.S. Substance Abuse Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Center for Mental Health Services as part of SAMHSA's national Project LAUNCH initiative to deliver mental health services to children birth to 8 and their families in New Britain.

- ✓ Expanded our community justice programs and:
 - ◆ Opened Alternative in the Community programs in Meriden and Middletown.
 - ◆ Launched new Juvenile Justice Intermediate Evaluation (JJIE) program to help maintain youth safety in the community and reduce the risk of further involvement with the courts.
 - ◆ Introduced Multidimensional Family Therapy Reentry and Family Treatment (MDFT-RAFT), a program that offers treatment to incarcerated adolescents with conduct and substance abuse issues and prepares them for reentry into the community.
 - ◆ Launched Multisystemic Therapy-Family Integrated Transitions (MST-FIT) to prepare youth and families for the transition period following incarceration.

- ✓ Received the 2010 SAMHSA Science and Service Award for our community-based continuum of care for youth exhibiting, or at risk of exhibiting, problem sexual behavior.

- ✓ Enhanced our outdoor learning space at Northwest Village School through a generous donation of time and talent from Loureiro Engineering Associates, Inc.

Helping Families Heal from Trauma

Community Response Team Services

- Crisis evaluations – most face-to-face evaluations occurring within one hour
- Resolution of the crisis in the home or community
- Follow up services
- Preservation of a safe, nurturing and supportive environment
- One-on-one support in clients' homes depending on circumstance

Outcome

- In FY 2011, the Community Response Team serviced 850 people.

Jeanette Q. and her family were nearly shattered by a traumatic assault last year. An emergency room visit and assistance from 2-1-1 led her to Wheeler Clinic’s Community Response Team (CRT), a service that provides crisis and early intervention to individuals and families who are experiencing a serious psychiatric emergency. Following Jeanette’s initial call, the team arrived at her home within 20 minutes.

“Before Wheeler, my life was unmanageable. I was unable to function,” said Jeanette, a resident of New Britain. “I had panic attacks and extreme anxiety. I was a ticking bomb.”

Wheeler Clinic’s CRT team – and other clinic professionals – worked closely with Jeanette’s family over a six-month period, providing an array of tools that bolstered the family’s sense of safety and strengthened communication among all members. “The goal of our work was to ensure that all family members felt safe in their home and effectively interacted with one another,” said Community Response Team crisis worker, Ruth Moschella. “We can see the enormous strides this family has made.”

Jeanette considers her own recovery a work in progress made possible by the compassion and dedication of Wheeler Clinic’s staff. “When I have anxiety, the Wheeler Clinic team and I try and figure out what’s causing it,” said Jeanette. “They don’t judge me in any way. I feel like they understand me.

“I couldn’t have made this progress without Wheeler Clinic,” she added. “I was hesitant at first to pick up the phone because of fear of the unknown, but once you make that call, you’ll see how your life will change.”



Fostering Hope and Recovery

Larry B.'s 25-year cocaine addiction and involvement with the court led him to treatment at Wheeler Clinic's Adult Outpatient Recovery Services in Hartford. With guidance and support from the clinic's team and participation in group therapy, he has been substance-free for nearly a year. The clinic's Adult Outpatient Recovery Services provide a variety of outpatient programs for adults and families that include individual, group and family therapy to address problems associated with substance abuse, depression, anxiety, anger management and other issues.

"Before the program, I was always looking for that next dollar to get high. I spent more than two hundred dollars a day on drugs," said Larry, a former furniture salesman and restoration expert. "But now, there's hope, there's a new way of doing things."

"Larry was determined to break the cycle of his addiction," said Tina Muller, LCSW, LADC, program manager, Wheeler Clinic Adult Services. "He has a gleam in his eye and a sincere desire to change his life."

Larry describes his experience at Wheeler Clinic as being very positive. "The Wheeler Clinic staff make you feel special. They make you feel like you're somebody," he said. "They are making all the difference in my recovery."

Outcomes

- Wheeler Clinic is the state's largest Enhanced Care Clinic (ECC), completing more than 11% of all evaluations in the state during the third quarter of FY 2011.
- Wheeler Clinic's ECC has exceeded the state ECC Access standard for the last two years for children and adult outpatient services. During the third quarter of FY 2011, 99.69% of clients were offered an initial assessment within 14 calendar days of their first call.

Engaging and Strengthening Families

Outcomes

- All of Wheeler Clinic's MST programs exceed established Connecticut benchmarks for helping youth avoid re-arrest.
- Wheeler Clinic's MST-Problem Sexual Behavior, and other DCF MST programs, exceed established Connecticut benchmarks for keeping youth at home, in school and in the community.
- Wheeler Clinic's MST programs continue to meet benchmarks in clinician model fidelity.

Sixteen-year-old Tamia* had the typical ups and downs of a teenager, and then some. A series of arguments with her family in January 2011 culminated in an explosive event that led to her short-term placement in the Connecticut Department of Children and Families (DCF) foster care system.

"We argued about anything and everything," said her mom, Diane. "She was out of control. I wanted to help her, but I needed someone to help me and my husband as well."

The family was referred by DCF to Wheeler Clinic's Multisystemic Therapy (MST) program, which serves youth ages 12-18 in their homes and communities. The clinic's MST program treats youth with complex emotional, social and academic needs, including chronic, violent, delinquent behavior; truancy; disrespect and disobedience; substance abuse and other issues.

"When we first started the program, our clinician gave us lots of homework to do, and we met three times a week or more if we needed it," said Diane. "She gave us the tools and skills we needed to improve communication in our family."

The family completed the program after four months of intensive treatment and has a positive outlook on the future. "The program taught us how to say what we feel instead of making hurtful statements to one another," said Diane. "I listen more and express myself differently. I practice these skills everyday."

Promising Starts

A six-year-old child struggles emotionally. His parents are not sure where to turn. His teachers, afterschool care provider and pediatric practice need additional help and training to understand his unique needs and connect him with the right resources in the community.

This scenario is all too common in communities across the state. In the city of New Britain, a comprehensive, federally funded program called Promising Starts, led by Wheeler Clinic and three community partners, will help change this reality by addressing the mental health needs of vulnerable children, ages birth to 8, and their families. The initiative, which is in its first year, is guided by the New Britain Childhood Wellness Council. The council is comprised of 33 public and private sector agencies and individuals serving young children and families.

“We’re working in a coordinated way to address the mental health needs of children early in their lives,” said Melissa Mendez, LCSW, Promising Starts coordinator. “By doing so, we build a strong foundation that increases the likelihood of longer-term success.”

Promising Starts’ primary goal is to foster healthy development in all young children in New Britain and prepare them to thrive in school and beyond. The program is designed to improve coordination of care within child-serving systems; improve access to higher quality care and services for young children and their families; and raise awareness about young child wellness through training, professional development and parent education programs. The program also will increase the number of developmental screenings for children birth to 8; increase the number of families receiving evidence-based home-visiting services; and expand mental health consultation in child care settings.

“Every child in this community deserves the chance to achieve his or her unique potential,” said Mendez. “We are strengthening families and systems to achieve this goal.”

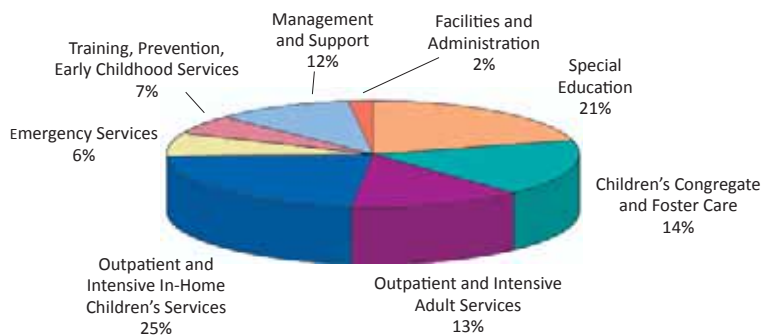

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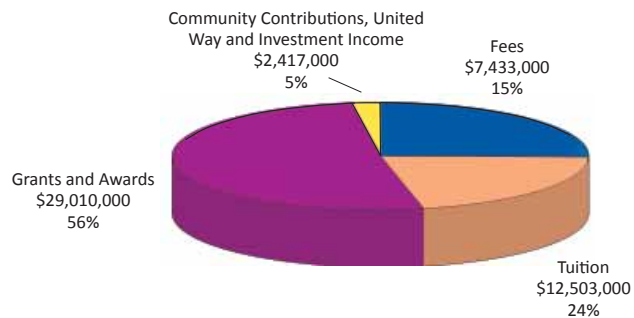
