Wheeler Expands Behavioral Health Services in Bristol Schools

Wheeler and the Bristol Public Schools have partnered to expand access to mental health services for students at Greene-Hills and West Bristol schools. New school-based behavioral health clinics located at these K-8 schools will employ a national cognitive behavioral intervention model to help students address trauma-related issues, including post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), depression and behavioral health issues, and provide other evidence-based interventions to address an array of problems, including anxiety, depression, academic and peer challenges, and more.

"Wheeler has collaborated with the Bristol Public Schools for more than 40 years to support student health and development," said Susan Walkama, LCSW, president and chief executive officer, Wheeler. "Our new partnership further expands our ability to deliver nurturing, traumainformed care to youth and families when and where services are most critically needed."

School-based Behavioral Health Clinics

Wheeler's school-based behavioral health clinics provide individual behavioral health services as well as linkage to other services in the Bristol community, including connections with primary and dental care, afterschool programming and a broad continuum of outpatient and communitybased levels of care. A Wheeler clinician supports each school location one day per week. Continued on page 3.

Wheeler Offers Medication-Assisted Treatment for Opioid, Alcohol Abuse

Wheeler offers an array of services to respond to the persistent community addiction crisis, including medication-assisted treatment (MAT) for opioid and alcohol abuse at four locations in central Connecticut. An initial clinical evaluation is available without an appointment.

MAT also is available to individuals transitioning back to the community following a period of incarceration through an innovative pilot program with the Connecticut Department of Correction.

for individuals and families to know where to turn for help for effective treatment options and to believe that recovery is possible."

Extended Release Naltrexone (Vivitrol®)

When combined with counseling, extended-release injectable Naltrexone, prescribed as Vivitrol®, is an effective evidencebased treatment that allows patients to stay abstinent longer, experience fewer cravings, and decrease their chances of relapse. Non-habit-forming, it works by blocking the effects of opioids and the pleasurable feelings produced by drinking.

Extended-release Naltrexone treatment includes monthly administration of the medication by injection and counseling services based on the individual's needs. Treatment is covered by Medicaid for eligible individuals as well as many commercial insurances and is subject to a co-pay or deductible.

MAT Vivitrol[®] Treatment for Individuals Returning to the Community

The Connecticut Department of Correction and Wheeler have partnered on a unique pilot program for individuals returning to the New Britain, Bristol and Plainville communities following a period of incarceration. The program includes pre- and postrelease engagement, care coordination and immediate access to Vivitrol® medication-assisted treatment, and other services for alcohol and/or heroin addiction.

Buprenorphine (Suboxone®, Zubsolv® or Bunavail®)

Buprenorphrine, most commonly prescribed as Suboxone,[®] is available by appointment at the Wheeler Health & Wellness Center, 999 Asylum Avenue, Hartford. Combined with counseling, it helps people reduce or quit their use of opioids.

Naloxone (Narcan[®])

Naloxone, commonly referred to as Narcan[®], is a medication that saves lives by reversing the effects of an opioid overdose. Behavioral health consumers, friends and family members can receive a prescription for Naloxone as early as the initial evaluation. The medication is administered at the time of the overdose.

School-based behavioral health clinics (cont.)

Helping Students Deal with Trauma

Wheeler's Cognitive Behavioral Intervention for Trauma in Schools (CBITS) program, delivered through the Bristol school-based health centers, is an evidence-based behavioral therapy model that delivers skill-based group interventions. The model, funded by the Connecticut Department of Children and Families (DCF), serves children in grades 4 through 8 and concentrates on relief from symptoms of PTSD and general anxiety among children and youth who have experienced trauma. The program involves individual, group and parent education sessions focusing on:

- Education about common reactions to trauma
- Relaxation training
- Cognitive therapy (understanding the links between thoughts, feelings and behaviors, and identifying and challenging maladaptive thoughts)
- Gradual exposure to trauma reminders
- Exposure to stress and trauma memory through drawing, writing, verbalization and social problem solving

Wheeler provides direct services to more than 2,300 individuals from Bristol each year. For more information, visit wheelerclinic.org/school-health.

Johnson Memorial Hospital and Wheeler Team Up to Expand Access to Behavioral Health Crisis Services

Children, adolescents, adults and families in northeastern Connecticut will have increased access to behavioral health crisis services, thanks to an agreement between Wheeler and Johnson Memorial Hospital.

Under the agreement, Wheeler assumes responsibility for Johnson Memorial Hospital's Emergency Department Crisis Service from 7 AM to 11:30 PM, seven days a week. Wheeler conducts crisis assessment, intervention and stabilization, clinical and case management services to provide immediate intervention and facilitated connections to community services, including primary and behavioral health care, intensive outpatient treatment and outpatient, residential treatment programs, and wraparound supports. All of these services offer long-term advantages over recurrent emergency department care.

"Wheeler and Johnson Memorial Hospital have a shared goal to promote whole-person health and improve the overall quality of life and care in the region," said Susan Walkama, LCSW, president and chief executive officer of Wheeler. "This coordinated, collaborative approach to care ensures access to high-quality services and supports, which prevents unnecessary emergency room visits, hospitalizations and re-admissions. The end result for everyone is better health outcomes, an improved care experience, lower costs and the most appropriate linkages to services that help individuals recover."

MST-BSF Program Expands to Manchester

Wheeler's Multisystemic Therapy - Building Stronger Families (MST-BSF) program, funded by the Department of Children and Families (DCF), has expanded to serve individuals and families in 19 cities and towns in Greater Manchester.

MST-BSF is an intensive, home-based approach for families with children ages 6-17 involved with DCF protective services due to neglect and physical abuse concerns and where there is also concern about the impact of parental substance abuse on the family. A central part of the model is intensive, empirically supported treatment focused on monitoring and treating parental substance abuse.

Wheeler was selected by model developers in 2005 to participate in a pilot study of MST-BSF. The Wheeler MST-BSF team—the only one of its kind at the time—served youth and families in 16 towns in Greater New Britain. Wheeler continued to be instrumental in working with model developers to refine the MST-BSF model, and in 2014 was selected to expand the program to serve Greater Hartford. Since the launch of the first team, Wheeler has partnered with model developers from the Medical University of South Carolina and participated in a federally



funded randomized control trial to expand the evidence base for the model. There are currently six MST-BSF teams in existence, including Wheeler's three teams. All are located in Connecticut.

"Families have demonstrated significant improvements due to Wheeler's MST-BSF services, and the outcomes our teams have achieved have led to further growth and expansion," said Elisabeth Cannata, Ph.D., vice president, Wheeler Community-based Family Services and Practice Innovation. Breast Health Patient Navigation Program Launched



Wheeler launched a Breast Health Patient Navigation program in partnership with Susan G. Komen®

Southern New England and Bristol Hospital's Beekley Center for Breast Health and Wellness. The program, funded by a \$76,930 grant from Komen, includes the addition of a patient navigator to significantly increase breast health outreach to residents in the Greater Bristol and New Britain communities. The patient navigation program will help increase patient awareness of breast health and breast cancer services, as well as eliminate barriers and increase access to breast health screening, diagnostics and other services.

"We know that Bristol and New Britain have high breast cancer mortality rates, and Bristol has a high incidence of breast cancer," said Heidi Joseph, RN, MSN, vice president of health

LEAP Childcare Program at New Britain YWCA Serves Young Children Affected by Trauma

Designed to meet the behavioral health needs of young children (ages 3-5) who have experienced significant abuse or neglect, the Learning Enhancement Attachment-based Pre-school (LEAP) program is under way. This trauma-informed, family-centered therapeutic day care program represents a partnership between the Department of Children and Families, Wheeler Clinic and the New Britain YWCA. The program serves up to 12 children from New Britain and their families. Wheeler and the YWCA have extensive experience working with pre-school aged children. The primary goals of the program focus on healthy social, emotional, physical and cognitive development, as well as school readiness and parenting skills.

"With appropriate intervention and support at an early age, children in the LEAP program will have a better start in school and in life," said Melissa Mendez, LCSW, IMH-E, director of Early Childhood Services, Wheeler. "We look forward to working collaboratively with the New Britain YWCA staff to serve young children and their families."

The therapeutic preschool classroom is located in the YWCA's licensed childcare center in New Britain. Wheeler provides clinical services and program oversight. The YWCA provides classroom staffing. Intimate Partner and Family Violence Programs Expand

Two of Wheeler's intimate partner and family violence programs—Family Violence Education Program (FVEP) and Explore—have expanded to serve the needs of more individuals and families in Connecticut.

"Everyone deserves a relationship that is healthy and free of any form of violence or abuse," said Sharlene Croteau, LCSW, director of Adult Services, Wheeler. "The FVEP and Explore programs are part of Wheeler's comprehensive continuum of services that address the complex issue of intimate partner and family violence and help individuals work toward behavioral changes that enhance the quality of their lives and promote family safety."



Family Violence Education Program Expands to Enfield

Wheeler's Family Violence Education Program (FVEP) has expanded to serve individuals in 12 towns in Greater Enfield. FVEP provides specialized intervention and education to individuals arrested for the first time for family violence offenses. Each group cycle meets for nine weekly group sessions, with separate groups for males and females. The new program, based at 9 Moody Road, Enfield, is accepting referrals from local family relations officers from the State of Connecticut Judicial Branch, Court Support Services Division (CSSD).

Wheeler's FVEP also serves individuals in Greater Bristol, Greater Hartford, Greater Middletown, Greater New Britain and Greater

Explore Program Now in Middletown

Wheeler's Explore program has expanded to serve adults in 16 towns in Greater Middletown.

The program provides CSSD-referred domestic violence offenders with the information and skills they need to change their behaviors and improve their current and future relationships. The program is a 26-session psychoeducational group intervention aimed at increasing offender accountability and

victim safety, and emphasizes peer confrontation, skills training and education. Wheeler's new Explore program is based at 2 Vance Drive, Middletown. For information, call 860.224.6396.

Mrs. Doris Nims Makes Historic Planned Gift

Mrs. Doris Nims, formerly of Cheshire, left a significant legacy gift of approximately \$1.9 million to Wheeler to advance programs and services that support children and adolescents.

Mrs. Nims, who passed away last year at the age of 89, was the daughter of Herman Papenfoth, one of Wheeler's earliest trustees and a leader in the Plainville community. Mrs. Nims was a woman ahead of her time. She held a degree in preschool education and was an independent, intelligent



woman with a good head for business. Her husband, Dr. Robert Nims, was a physician at the VA Medical Center in West Haven.

As an early trustee, Mr. Papenfoth, or "Pap," helped set Wheeler on a solid financial foundation with the strong business orientation he would pass on to his daughter Dorie. He also shared his commitment to Wheeler's mission with her.

"It is an honor to steward Mrs. Nims' legacy," said Susan Walkama, LCSW, president and chief executive officer, Wheeler. "The gift is among the largest ever received by Wheeler and will be invested in our continuing transformation to a community health system."

Wheeler traces its beginnings to a generous bequest in 1960 from prominent Plainville resident Bertha Wheeler. Mrs. Wheeler's gift helped to establish the clinic in 1968 and led to the 1972 construction of the first facility at 91 Northwest Drive in Plainville.

"It is particularly meaningful when local families who were part of Wheeler's five decades of service support us in this way," added Walkama. "I believe they see the value and potential that Wheeler brings to the communities where we live and work."
